Theme and Focus for Word of God Sunday: Jubilee Year Context: Emphasize that the Jubilee Year is a time of renewal, reconciliation, and deepening faith. The Word of God plays a central role in this journey, as it provides guidance, inspiration, and transformation. Link the Jubilee theme of "Pilgrims of Hope" (if officially designated) to the Word of God, highlighting Scripture as a lamp for our path (Psalm 119:105). Scripture as a Living Word: Reflect on how the Word of God is not just a text but a living, active force (Hebrews 4:12). Encourage the congregation to see Scripture as God speaking directly to their hearts in today's context. Personal and Communal Renewal: A deeper engagement with Scripture through Bible studies, Lectio Divina, or group reflections. Highlight the Eucharist and Scripture together: just as we are nourished by Christ in the Eucharist, we are also nourished by His Word. Pope Francis suggests, "May you have the habit of always carrying a small Gospel in your pocket, in your bag, to be able to read it during the day". There are several editions of the New Testament or the Gospel, in handy little volumes, pocket versions, that easily fit in our bags or backpacks and that we can carry with us at all times. Pope Francis continued: "What would happen if we treated the Bible as we treat our mobile phone? If we always carried it with us, or at least the pocket-sized Gospel, what would happen? If we turned back when we forgot it, if we opened it several times a day, if we read God's messages contained in the Bible as we read messages on our mobile phones?" The Pope highlighted the importance of always keeping God's Word close to us, just as we keep our phones-a tool we often prioritize in our daily lives. He pointed out that in today's digital age, it's easy to access the Scriptures through mobile apps, giving us the opportunity to meditate on God's Word anytime and anywhere.

This committee will examine the Bill in detail, after which it will then return to the floor of the House of Commons for a further substantive vote. This vote will probably take place in late April or early May. The Bill could be defeated in that important division.
